

General Education Requirements

These requirements are intended to promote breadth of knowledge, integration of disciplinary perspectives, and understanding of diverse cultures. Wofford's program seeks to develop skills in reading, written and oral communication, use of technology, critical thinking, creative expression, numerical reasoning, problem solving, and collaborative and independent learning. The college identifies these competencies as vital to intellectual and personal growth. While these competencies are developed in all courses in the curriculum, they are the explicit focus of general education courses.

Courses which meet General Education requirements are listed below. The same course may not be used to satisfy more than one General Education requirement, but can be used to satisfy major requirements.

HUMANITIES 101, 3 Credit Hours

All new first-year students are required to take HUM 101 First-Year Seminar in the Humanities during the fall semester of their initial year of enrollment. Students who do not pass the course during the fall semester will be required to retake it during the spring semester of their first-year of enrollment.

Foreign language placement is determined by the faculty of the Department of Modern Languages, Literatures & Cultures and is typically based on the student's previous level and quantity of foreign language study. The requirement is met by successfully completing a course sequence (101/102) **OR** one 200-level course as noted below. *Please note introductory-level Chinese (CHIN 101/102) and Arabic (ARBC 101/102) language courses meet everyday and are 5 credit hours each.*
